BCOR 111: Principles of Microeconomics (3 credits) This course focuses on an understanding of basic economics from a microeconomic standpoint. Prerequisite: High School Algebra M&W 5-6:20 pm

LENG 247: Introduction to Literature (3 credits) This course helps students develop an appreciation, understanding and evaluation of literature as it reflects human experience in diverse cultural contexts. The course focuses on the essential elements of prose, drama, and poetry. *Prerequisites: LENG 111, 112* W 6:30-9:20pm

LFIN 251: Introduction to Music (*3 credits*) The aim of this course is to guide the student to a more perceptive and meaningful enjoyment of the art of music. After having been acquainted with musical materials and procedures, the student will be introduced to selected works characteristic of different style periods. T 6:30-9:20pm

SOCI 110: Basic Sociology (3 credits) This course is intended as a general introduction to sociology, i.e., a scientific focus on society, groups, and social behavior. Its purpose is to develop in the student a greater capacity to interpret and evaluate the social world. M 6:30-9:20pm

LPHI 131: Introduction to Philosophy (3 credits) An introduction to the study of philosophy. Beginning with the dawn of philosophical awareness among the ancient Greek philosophers, the course surveys both traditional and modern approaches to the philosophical understanding of the human condition. TH 6:30-9:20pm

LHST 111: History Without Borders (*3 credits*) The most important ideas, issues, problems, and developments that mark the changing fortunes of the West's interaction with the world from the Seventeenth Century to the present. TH 6:30-9:20pm

CIS 250: Business Technology II (3 credits) A hands-on study of the application of personal computers in a modern, networked business environment. Builds on material covered in CIS 150 Business Technology I. Provides instruction in the use of Microsoft Office components, with particular emphasis on advanced modeling using Excel. Other topics covered will be creation of web pages via HTML and other web authoring tools, integration of various Microsoft Office applications. Prerequisite: CIS150 T&TH 5-6:20pm

BCOR 250: Management Theory & Practice (3 credits) This course will introduce students to the principles of management. From the organizational and behavioral aspects to process and management techniques of everyday business, this course is designed to give students a social, historical, legal, economic, and environmental knowledge and understanding of business processes, their measurement and interdependency as well as the ability to successfully cope within an ambiguous setting. Prerequisites: BCOR 105, BCOR 111, and BCOR 112 T 6:30-9:20pm

POLI 111: U.S. Government and Politics (3 credits) The primary goal of this course is to help students understand politics and the political process of the American National Government. It covers the standard features of U.S. politics—the Constitution, federalism, interest groups, political parties, Congress, the presidency, the courts. Students also learn how to analyze political events and how to relate their own values to politics. M 6:30-9:20pm

PSYC 222: Psychology of Human Development (3 credits) An investigation of the theories and research findings related to the understanding of complex behavior as it evolves throughout the lifespan. Prerequisite: PSYC 111 W 6:30-9:20pm

Is College right for me? And other FAQs!

How does the RRC differ from a traditional community college?

This college does not operate on a single traditional campus-based model; nor is it an online college. The RRC utilizes multiple locations across the region to deliver its programming. Courses are offered in a variety of ways, including in the classroom, via live interactive video technology, and through hands-on learning with equipment and lab facilities.

What are the admissions requirements?

The RRC is an open-admissions college. There are <u>no additional admissions requirements</u> for individuals who have earned (1) a high school diploma, a GED® or an approved alternative, and (2) live within one of the nine countries served by the college: Cameron, Crawford, Elk, Erie, Forest, McKean, Potter, Venango, and Warren.

Can I take classes before I graduate from high school?

If you are still in high school, you can take classes at the RRC once you have completed your sophomore year if your cumulative GPA is high enough. If you are a high school senior, you must carry at least a 3.25 cumulative GPA on a 4.0 scale. If you are a high school junior, you must carry at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA on a 4.0 scale.

So, is College right for me?

If you aren't sure, try our classes! You can try college at any of over 20 locations close to home. The lower tuition allows many students to graduate debt free, and the RRC classes are eligible for traditional financial aid.

I am currently a full-time student at another college/university. Can I take courses with the RRC over the summer when I am home?

Yes, guest students are welcome to take courses at the RRC. Courses and credits are transferable to other institutions, but you should always discuss your plans with your primary college's advisors to make sure you are making the most of your opportunities.

What degrees are offered by the RRC?

The RRC currently offers two associate degrees: Interdisciplinary Studies and Business Management. More degree programs (including technical offerings) and noncredit courses will be offered in upcoming years.

Scholarships Available for Eligible Students
